



Did you know that Ukraine has been using so many drones that they must have air traffic control? The Insider states, "Ukrainian forces are sending so many drones to the front line in its war with Russia that they've developed a dispatch system akin to air traffic control". This means that Ukraine has been using a lot of drones. Also, did you know that if we never put sanctions on gas for Russia our gas prices would be around 3.50 a gallon. That's almost 50 cents less. It is the same because Biden still promotes electric cars. In the war, there have been more than 6.2 million refugees fleeing from Ukraine this year. There have been lots of missile strikes, but one of the devastating attacks was a missile strike on Russia's headquarters, killing 34 officers. Unreasonable Excanges


••• Most people have heard about prisoner exchange, but most do not know how unreasonable these exchanges can be. Recently the United States brought back 5 American citizens from Iran. The 5 people were Siamak Namazi, Morad Tahbaz, Emad Shargi, and two unnamed persons.Just in this one single exchange the United States gave Iran five to six billion dollars in a trade for their release. In an NPR article it states that Namazi was sentenced to 10 years in 2015 and while he was there he was physically and mentally tortured. Namazi was the longest held Iranian American hostage in history and all for the crime of cooperating with a hostile government. The next prisoner was Tahbaz, who was arrested in 2018 and sentenced to 10 years for suspicion of spying. Tahbaz was working on a conservation project where he had to track animals with cameras, later on eight of Tahbaz colleagues were also arrested. Tahbaz had a past of cancer and was ill while imprisoned. His wife was also punished, she remained stuck in Iran because the government withheld her passport. In the end, she did return with her husband back to the U.S. The last named prisoner was Shargi, who was born in Iran but left as a young boy. Shargi was first arrested in 2018 and was able to get out on bail 8 months later. The Iranian government withheld his passport and he was arrested once again in 2020, this time sentenced to 10 years for espionage. Exchanging isn't free; it is actually very VERY expensive. This costly exchange was not the first time the United States had saved innocent people from being imprisoned and it won't be the last.

The original prisoner exchange started during the Civil War in 1862; it was how the Americans and the opposing side showed an act of humanity. In the last ten years, the U.S. has successfully executed many exchanges. In 2014, there was an exchange with the Taliban. In 2016 and 2019 the US cooperated with Iran on an exchange. In 2022 an exchange took place with Russia and finally the one mentioned above with Iran. Perhaps the most talked about exchange was probably the one in Russia, which included a WNBA player named Brittney Griner and a Russian arms dealer named Viktor Bout. Brittney was arrested under charges of smuggling cannabis oil into the country and was sentenced to nine years. While Viktor Bout, on the other hand, was convicted in 2011 of conspiracy to have killed American citizens. When the U.S. exchanged Bout for Griner, the majority opinion argued that the crimes could not be comparable, Bout could be held responsible for helping to end thousands of lives, yet Griner broke a simple law many would consider harmless. In this instance the U.S. exchanged a murder for a drug user, outrage followed what seemed to be a very obvious uneven trade. The most recent exchange with Iran is estimated to have cost the U.S. five to six billion dollars. People's lives aren't cheap but shouldn't the gravity of peoples' crimes matter when considering these exchanges?

The United States is known as the freest country in the world but we still have laws and rules. Singapore is known as the strictest country in the world with Japan following in second and China coming in third. Some rules these places have are very strict and harsh, unimaginable to foreigners. This makes it very easy to do something that might be legal in one country but not another. One such rule exists in Singapore where a law against chewing gum exists. The punishment for this simple act is a big fine. Up to 100,000 dollars can be lost over a 99 cent pack of gum. Japan also has very upsetting rules, one example being that parents have restrictions on what they can name their own child. This is also a rule in China. There is Chinese law stating that Russians must announce their presence out loud. As ridiculous as these laws may seem, there is always a reason to follow them, that is- punishment.

Exchanging one prisoner who smokes weed for another who is a murderer Is unfair to the country and its people. Just like how it is wrong to imprison innocent people for a crime that isn't that big of a deal. These prisoner exchanges can be unreasonable, unfair, and very expensive. But in the end it is worth it for the person who is freed.



Swimming and Diving ranked 10th out of the top 10 most popular High School Sports among boys in the U.S. by Statista, and because of swimming's low popularity, some students may be hesitant to join. However, competitive swimming is a sport with unique benefits that set it apart from other athletic pursuits. If you are interested in competitive swimming, but unsure, or just curious, read on! The Unique Benefits of Competitive Swimming Just as any sport, swimming has its own unique benefits. First and foremost, you can swim for your entire life; while many land sports, like football, soccer, basketball, etc., you may not be able to do when you are old.  Competitive swimming fits this description and is even included in the Olympics, so it can certainly be considered a legitimate sport.


2. "Swimming is easy because it is low impact." - While swimming is low impact because you are moving through the water rather than colliding with others or the land, it uses many muscles at a time, and requires

lots of strength, endurance, and lung capacity, making it relatively hard. 3. "It's a solo sport only." - Swimming is mostly considered an individual sport, but you are on a team! You can also do team relay races, making it a team sport occasionally.

- "Swimmers don't need strength training." -Swimmers absolutely do participate in strength training, they just might not be lifting a ton of weights like the football team would.
- 5. "Swimmers don't need mental toughness."
- Mental toughness applies to all sports, and swimmers will have to face opposition.
 6. "It's just for athletes with natural talent." -Many swimmers have had to work for years to nail down proper technique and speed.

My Experience on a Competitive Swim Team

I experienced 5 1-2 hour practices on my club team during the week. These sessions included rigorous lap swimming, dry-land exercises, sprints, breath control training, and technique work. Discipline was essential because attending practices and meets throughout the season was crucial. Swim meets could be a few hours long and take place at different locations throughout Utah. It's worth noting, however, that according to Coach Tammy at a high school swim meet, some of the longest or more extreme events you'd see at a club meet, such as the 400 Individual Medley, won't take place. Excelling in the pool required lots of practice, dedication, and hard work, just as with any other sport.


